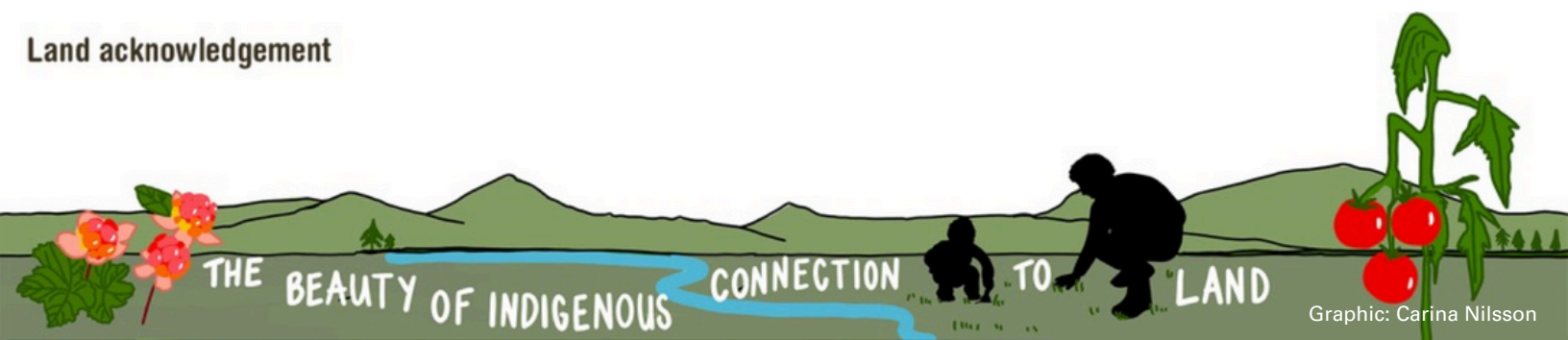

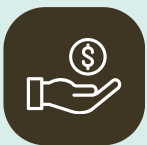

Nourishing Indigenous Food & Foodways in Schools

This 4-year \$2.8M initiative intends to support Indigenous school communities throughout the country to have more capacity to harvest, preserve, grow and serve more Indigenous food and other nourishing food to children and youth, including harvested plants, game and fish from nearby lands and waters, and to engage students in Indigenous foodways and gain food skills. It builds on and is in response to what we have heard in our [Nourishing Relations](#) work, which began in 2021.

Much of the 2023/24 year was spent designing this initiative, securing funding, and planning its implementation, which began in January 2024. We are honoured to host this work in partnership with Indigenous and non-Indigenous organizations, school communities and a Circle of Advisors, from across the country.

Core activities of this initiative include:

Develop and roll out a dedicated grant stream for Indigenous school communities along with peer mentorship opportunities.

Create a K-12 learning journey for educators and others working in schools, inspired by Nourish’s [Food is Our Medicine](#) learning journey.

Host a Canada-wide Indigenous school foodways gathering and other in-person and virtual events and conversations to support relationship building and knowledge sharing.

Dig in! Seed Grant Program

In September 2023 we launched this exciting new grant stream in partnership with The Schad Foundation.

Designed to support schools looking to get started on their farm or local food to school journey, these new grants were designed to fill a gap we heard existed from school communities across the country:



Access to small, flexible grants with limited barriers to application for those looking to get started on small projects to improve their school food environments.

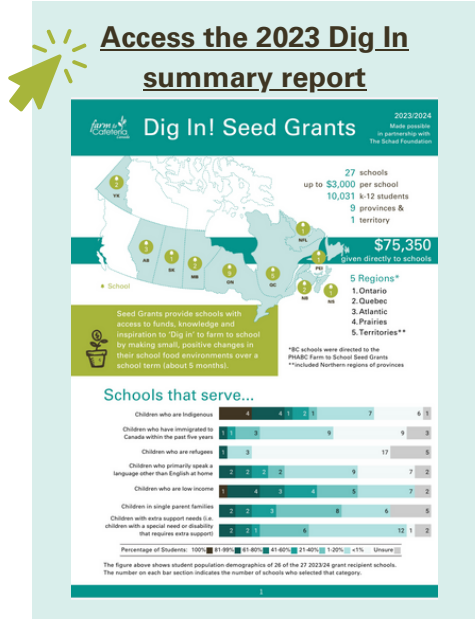

Individual grants were provided in amounts ranging from \$500 - \$3,000 with funds being used to purchase equipment and/or facilitate activities that would improve students' access to healthy, local and culturally appropriate food and food literacy activities.

Up to 20% of the grants could also be allocated toward purchasing food, with an emphasis on purchasing from, and developing relationships with, local farmers or other local food providers.

Farm to School Canada Grants Program

Delivered in partnership with Whole Kids Foundation since 2016, this flagship grant program encourages a comprehensive approach to school food where students experience hands-on food literacy and have access to a healthy, culturally appropriate meal service where students are encouraged to build their own bowls and create their own plates using a salad bar model.

This year the recipients of the 4th cycle of these grants continued with their activities that started last year, while our team launched the 5th cycle (2024-2026) call for applications of projects to begin in September 2024.

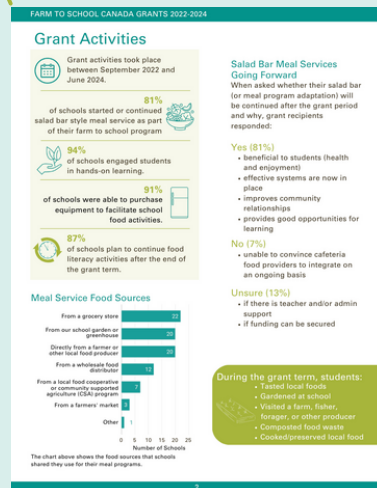

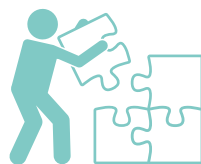
For years, educators have shared with us a need for more resources and professional development opportunities to help them teach about food and make connections between curricula and food systems.

This initiative aims to develop the first-of-its-kind Canada-wide training and resource hub to provide educators and other school food practitioners with access to knowledge, tools, resources, connections and inspiration to grow their capacity to design and deliver engaging, equitable and evidence-based food literacy programs across Canada. With the right tools, there is potential to reach thousands of students each year.

Launched this year, our efforts focused on the first of four phases: **planning**. As a partnership-based organization, it is important to our team that this work be developed in meaningful collaboration with the communities it will serve. Our planning started with 1) a needs assessment, including interviews with educators from across the country to inform next steps; and 2) the development of a competencies framework to which hub offerings will be linked.

Work will progress into the Develop phase in the year ahead.

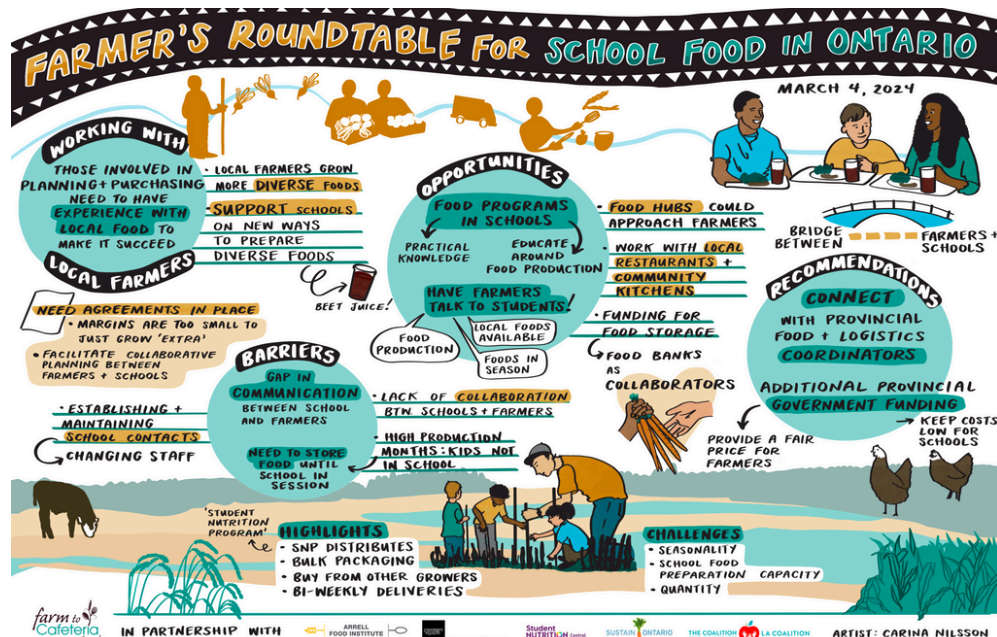
Local Food in Schools

With a vision for food systems that nourish people and the planet, local food systems have always been central to our work. However, connecting to local food sources and distribution networks remains one of the most commonly cited challenges we hear from the school communities with which we work. This year, 2 projects focused on understanding and addressing this challenge.

First, in partnership with Farm to School BC, we launched a 3-year pilot in the Kootenay region of BC to develop a new farm to school regional hub that seeks to explore and leverage economic development opportunities for farmers and other local food providers in response to the provincial Feeding Futures commitment announced in winter 2023.

Second, we were fortunate to partner with the University of Guelph on an 8-month project as part of the *Innovation and Entrepreneurship in Agri-Food Systems* course. We worked with 4 graduate students to explore a food system challenge: the untapped potential to purchase and serve local food in school food programs. One of the several activities undertaken as part of this work was an Ontario farmers' roundtable, summarized in the graphic below.

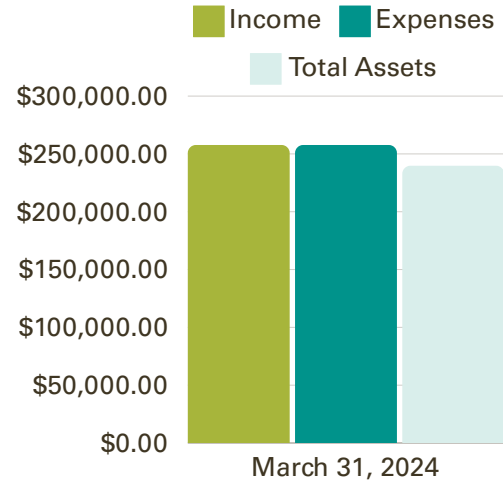
Financial Snapshot

As reported in our last Annual Report, the previous fiscal year was one of transition from an administrative host, under which F2CC had previously operated since 2014.

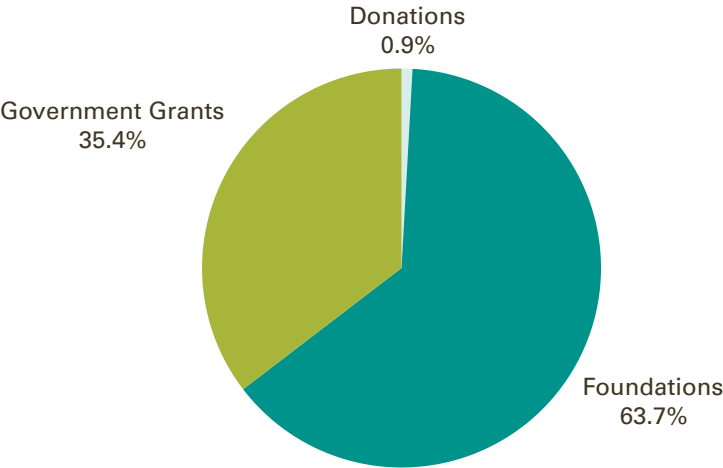
The 2023/24 fiscal year represented F2CC’s first full fiscal year as an independent charitable organization, during which we experienced steady financial growth.

We anticipate this growth to continue in the year ahead as our programs and services are further established in this new and exciting chapter for our organization, and for school food in Canada.

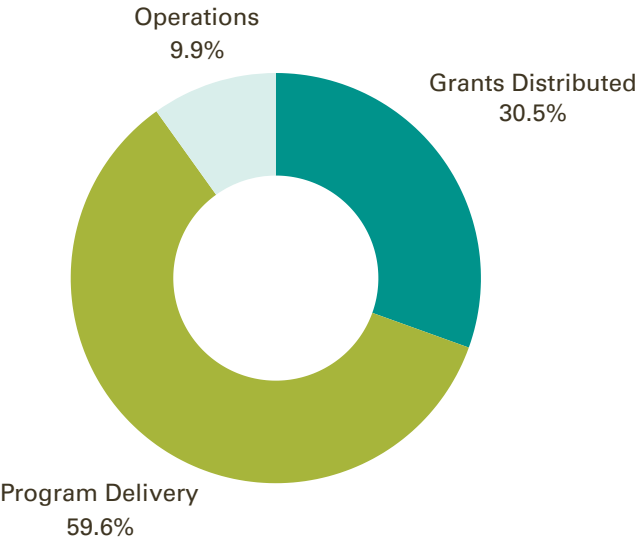
INCOME VS. EXPENSES
